# Overview

#### Flooding in Hardwick

3 Federally Declared Disasters for Flooding in one year (July 2023, June 2024 and July 2024)

2 additional events - December 2023 and August 2024.

#### **Recent Impacts**

- 1.5 million expended by the town
- 20 roads impacted
- 6 bridges closed
- 1 major landslide in East Hardwick
- 4 At-risk properties purchased
- 2 critical facilities damaged

#### **Biggest risk**

Continued flooding

# Mill Street (Inn by the River) and Hays Service Station

- July 2023 Flooding
- Town Purchase through FRCF
- Pre-application for a HMGP grant
- July 2024 Flooding
- Temporary Bank Stabilization by the State of Vermont at the request of the Town
- Application requested from Town for Floodplain Restoration & Bank Stabilization.



#### Downtown Hardwick

- July 2023 Flooding
- July 2024 Worse impacts from flooding
- Pre-Application submitted to HMGP to create a comprehensive approach to the Riverbanks
- 10+ properties Reviewed by NRCS for Emergency Watershed Protection grants
- Temporary stabilization measures were installed by Gravel Construction at Mike's Service Station.



#### Lower Lamoille River

- Pre-Application submitted to HMGP to utilize the Town-owned property below Cottage Street Bridge for Floodplain restoration/mitigation project.
- Below the intersection of Cooper Brook and the Lamoille River.
- Identified as a beneficial project by the Lamoille Basin Tactical Plan in 2021.
- Provide more flooding capacity downstream on the Lamoille River



# Flood Mitigation by Yellow Barn, LVRT, the Wastewater Treatment Plant, and Lamoille Valley Ford

- Storm water system and flood capacity near this area needs to be repaired and upgraded.
- Near the Wastewater Treatment Facility
- Near the Wolcott Street Commercial District.




#### **Granite Street Historic District**

- July 2023 Flooding
- July 2024 Only area that had increased flood amounts
- Cooper Brook expands
- Neighborhood focused response private sump pump to assist several homes.
- Historic basements need to be floodproofed.
- Floodplain restoration at Atkins Field
- Pre-application for a BRIC grant.



#### Hardwick Fire Station

- July 2023 Substantially Damaged.
- July 2024 Damaged again.
- Critical Facility that needs to be relocated from the Floodplain/Floodway
- Standard Operating Procedure is to remove equipment in weather events.
- MTAP grant received to conduct a scoping study for relocation to Creamery Road.
- Location could be used for future floodplain restoration.



### Wastewater Treatment Facility Plant

- July 2023 Flooded Substantially Damaged.
- July 2024 Flooded Substantially Damaged.
- Critical Facility in the Floodplain needs to be elevated or relocated.
- State and Federal partners will be developing proposals and identifying funding sources.



#### Debris Removal from the Rivers

- July 2023 Flooding
- December 2023 Flooding
- June 2024 Flooding

- Kate Brook Road new culvert 8/1/24
- Belfry Road asphalt damaged
- Bunker Hill Road open 8/1/24
- Smith Farm Road fixed shoulder 8/1/24
- Dutton Road upsized culvert 7/25/24
- Nichols Pond Road upsized culvert 7/25/24
- Stage House Road upsized culvert 7/25/24

- Wright Farm Road State repaired apron 7/25/24
- Stannard Mountain Road Hardwick section repaired - 7/25/24
- Tucker Brook open on 7/30/24


# 6 Damaged Bridges from 2023 and 2024

- Tucker Brook (2023) Temporary held in 2024
- Carey Road box culvert/bridge Temporary
  Fix in 2024
- Riverside Farms Bridge destroyed in 2024 Temporary in construction now 9/24
- Fisher's Folly Bridge damaged in 2023 and 2024. Temporary in place 8/24
- Hardwick Farms Road Bridge damaged
  2023 & 2024 temporary done 8/24.
- East Main Street in East Hardwick damaged
  2023 emergency removal in 5/24.



# 2023 Buyouts in process (10) - Flood Mitigation projects in the future.

- 4 purchased in the spring of 2024 demolished and seeded & mulched 223
  Mill Street (Inn by the River), 2832
  Craftsbury Rd,387 Carey Road, and School Street in E. Hardwick
- 5 just returned from FEMA with funding
- 1 is still at FEMA awaiting an award.
- Pre-Application submitted for 2 HMGP projects - Floodplain Restoration on the Lamoille River and Floodplain Mitigation on Cooper Brook.




# NRCS - Emergency Watershed Protection assistance - 2023 and 2024

- After the July 2023 Flooding 13 properties reviewed
- 3 properties accepted into the program all need bank stabilization - 2 on the Lamoille River and 1 on Haynesville Brook
- 2 have received engineering bids are being solicited to begin the work
- 1 is still in the engineering phase in process.

- After the July 2024 Flooding 12-13 properties were reviewed.
- Only one would not meet the program standards.
- 1 on Cooper Brook and the rest on the Lamoille River.
- Awaiting acceptance letter from the program.


# 2024 Buyouts in process

- The Select Board voted on July 18, 2024 to re-open the buyout requests. The Town has received inquiries from floodplain homeowners. All interested owners have flooded on multiple occasions. Several will not seek a buyout if the town is able to install flood mitigation and/or protection for their property.
- Vermont Fish & Wildlife is interested in purchasing two parcels on the Haynesville Brook.



#### Elevations - 2023 and 2024

- July 2023 5 requests to elevate
- August 2023 1 elevation completed remained out of flooding in July 2024
- July 2024 2 additional requests to elevate
- The State of Vermont has allocated money for elevation projects in 5 towns including Hardwick
- Waiting for the State to create the framework for the funding.



# Floodproofing in 2024

- July 2023 Flooding impacted the Wolcott Street Commercial District
- August 2024 Flooding
- Pre-applications for four commercial properties to receive assistance with Dry Floodproofing their structures.



# Additional Projects in the Works

- Flood modeling with LCPC EDA grant received (to be done by 2025).
- Overarching watershed study of the Cooper Brook through NRCS
- Pre-Application for a Hazard Mitigation Grant for a Generator at the Police Station.
- Study of the Jackson Dam/Hardwick Lake.
- Advance Assistance Grant for scoping possible flood mitigation plans including dredging feasibility.



### Next steps

- Continue to refine disaster response
- Develop future funding strategies and partnerships
- Study new conditions
- Work with State and Federal partners to identify priorities for implementation
- Examine the entire Lamoille River Basin with upstream and downstream communities
- Create projects eligible for FEMA reimbursement
