- Check to identify if there is a wetland on property you are looking to purchase and develop. There are several ways that you can check for wetlands:
  - <u>Wetland Screening Tool</u>: use this tool for the easiest and recommended way to see if a property has wetlands or to know if your plan may be affected by wetland laws.
  - oldentify wetlands on the ground: refer to our What is a Wetland? page with information on how to identify a wetland. Our Landowner's Guide to Wetlands is a handy guide that includes a checklist to help spot a potential wetland or buffer zone on the ground.
  - oCheck for Wetlands Before You Buy or Build educational campaign.

Please note: by Vermont law, landowners and/or contractors are not allowed to disturb ground within 50 feet of an identified wetland without a wetland permit.
